



Cuyahoga River AOC Habitat Restoration

Status of the Cuyahoga River Area of Concern

- The Cuyahoga River was designated an Area of Concern (AOC) under the 1987 Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement.
- The area was considered highly degraded due to poor water quality, loss of biodiversity, and land use changes.
- The boundary of the AOC was expanded in 2010 to include the Gorge Dam pool.
- Since 2010, more than \$13 million from the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative has been used to fund more than 40 projects to remediate and restore this AOC.
- In 2016, the NOAA-GLC Regional Partnership provided funds required for the engineering and design of the Cascade Valley View Restoration Project at Cuyahoga River.
- In 2019, the NOAA-GLC Regional Partnership provided additional funding required for the implementation of the Cascade Valley View Restoration Project.
