

# Habitat Restoration Partnerships

### **Great Lakes Areas of Concern**

Habitat restoration in Areas of Concern (AOCs) and other important areas is a priority for many agencies and organizations across the Great Lakes.

**43 watersheds,** or portions of watersheds, along the Great Lakes suffering from degraded environmental conditions stemming from historic and ongoing pollution.

Restoration projects contribute to delisting AOCs, realizing environmental and economic benefits, and enhancing the quality of life for local and regional citizens.

#### **Regional Partnerships**

NOAA GLRI funding mechanism resulting in implementation of habitat restoration projects focused in U.S. AOCs



Partnership recipients guide local sub-recipients that collectively implement a suite of restoration projects Organizations apply for Partnerships through a competitive process to demonstrate capacity to implement a variety of habitat restoration projects

#### **Funding Regional Partnerships**



- Congress sets funding for the GLRI each year. For example, in 2019 the GLRI was funded at \$300 million for all 5 focus areas
- Administrators at EPA determine priority projects by consulting with the Great Lakes states, other federal agencies involved with AOCs, and AOC coordinators
- AOCs create EPA approved lists that outline their habitat restoration projects. These are the best, and most feasible, projects that will lead to "de-listing" the AOC

Sometimes AOCs don't have a local unit of government willing, or able, to oversee large-scale habitat restoration projects. Instead, EPA gives funding to other government agencies that either implement projects directly, or administer programs to distribute funds through competitive grants or programs like the NOAA Regional Partnerships
